JOHN DANIELS – HANNIBAL BOOSTER CLUB

Re: Request, Traffic Control

(5K Road Race – July 17, 2010 – 7:45 a.m. – 10:00 a.m.)

Mr. John Daniels came before Council, on behalf of the Hannibal Boosters Club to request the city's assistance in conjunction with a fund-raising event, known as the 5K Road Race on July 17, 2010 from 7:45 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. His specific request was for assistance at the corners of Bridge/North Street and at the Riverview Park entrance. Daniels added that, since the race route is the only outlet for the residents on these streets, they did not request street closure. He explained that Chris Atkinson, the Parks Director, has agreed to close Riverview Park for the event and has given the Booster Club permission to end the race at Cardiff Hill Overlook. Motion was made by Council Member Knickerbocker to approve Daniel's request. Motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Behymer.

Mayor Hark recognized Brendan Henderson and Darrell McCoy, of the Hannibal JayCees, who was seeking Council's permission to hold the 55th Annual National Tom Sawyer Days festival during the July 4th holiday. JayCee requests were as follows:

- Use of City-owned property, known as Nipper Park for Tanyard Gardens
- Permission for alcohol sales at Tanyard Gardens location
- Street closures as follows:
 - Broadway from 4th Street to the riverfront, except 3rd St. for carnival
 - Intersection of Hill/Main Sts. For fence-painting (7/2, 3:00-7:00 p.m. & 7/3, 1:00-7:00 p.m.)
 - Broadway, from Grand Ave to 10th St. for parade line-up (7/3, 8:00 a.m.)
 - Broadway, from Grand Ave. to 4th St. for parade (7/3, 9:00 a.m.–?)
- Use of Lovers Leap for fireworks display (7/3-7/5)
- Waive license fee for carnival
- Use of Kiwanis Park for additional games and small rides for younger children
- Use of movable barricades at each end of railroad tracks on Broadway
- Snow fencing to assist in securing the boat parking lot (for overflow of carnival and food vendors)
- Assistance with obtaining water and electric in Nipper Park and Kiwanis Park
- Permission for 2-3 RV camper parking on boat parking lot for vendors

An alternate plan was included in the case of a flood situation. This was also detailed. McCoy explained that a meeting would be held in May that would include City staff to finalize all plans. Council Member Louderman made a motion to approve the requests as presented by McCoy, regarding use of City property, street closures, carnival license and liquor sales during this event. JASON STANDBRIDGE – POPS CLUB
Re: Requests, Street Closure, Use of City Owned Property, Alcohol Sales
(The Muddy River BBQ Festival – June 4-5, 2010)

Jason Standbridge, representative for the POP's Club, came before Council with a request for permission to utilize City property and to sell alcohol at the Muddy River BBQ Festival to be held on June 4-5, 2010. As in past years, Standbridge requested use of the Y-Men's Pavilion and the

portion of Hill Street directly in front of the pavilion. Additionally, because of their recent inclusion in the Kansas City Masterpiece BBQ circuit and the increase in the number of participating teams in the competition, he requested the use of the city parking lot on the river side of the flood wall from Center Street to Hill Street, as well. Standbridge explained that the POP's Club was requesting permission to put their judging tent in Schwartz Park on the riverfront in order to meet the requirements of the Kansas City Masterpiece circuit. He added that the event is a great thing, as far as revenue for the City since there will be many overnight tourists in attendance. He assured Council that security would be provided for alcohol sales and for those arriving and departing the event. In response to a question posed by Council Member Knickerbocker, Standbridge explained that the event was sanctioned by KCBS last year and state sanctions have been received this year. Motion was made by Council Member Knickerbocker to approve Standbridge's request. Motion was seconded by Council Member Dobson.

KEVIN KNICKERBOCKER – 1ST WARD COUNCIL MEMBER

Re: Alcohol Consumption in Public

(Bill No. 10-014, to follow)

Council Member Knickerbocker spoke on behalf of Bill No. 10-014, regarding alcohol consumption in public. If approved this bill will receive a first reading, later during the meeting. Knickerbocker explained that during discussions with the City Attorney, it was discovered that some language in the bill that needed cleaned-up. As the original ordinance was written, there was a constant need to waive it for various events and functions in the City.

The language in Bill No. 10-014 has been changed to be consistent with Council's practice, allowing these events to serve/sell alcohol. Previously, a bill was submitted that was too detail-oriented; therefore, Council Member Lyng suggested changes to simplify the original bill. The results were put into bill format by City Attorney Lemon for submission. Passage of this bill will eliminate the need to waive the current regulations and permit the approved activities to offer alcohol.

Mayor Pro Tem Behymer questioned the wording of the ordinance with regard to the recent discussion concerning alcohol consumption at the Y-Men's Pavilion or the Admiral Coontz Armory. According to Knickerbocker, the Parks and Recreation Department will still have the authority to allow or prohibit alcohol consumption in those areas, in addition to the pavilions located in the parks.

Council Member Dobson questioned whether or not Police Chief Davis had a chance to examine the bill and what his opinion was; however, Davis responded that he had not reviewed the bill.

JEFF LAGARCE – CITY MANAGER

MARK REES – CITY ENGINEER

Re: South Main Street Pedestrian Warning Devices – Short Form of Agreement

Poepping, Stone, Bach and Associates
(Resolution No. 1647-10, to follow)

City Engineer Mark Rees came before Council with a request for approval of a short form agreement with Poepping, Stone, Bach and Associates to provide the engineering services for installation of pedestrian warning devices at the railroad crossing on South Main Street. Rees explained that the devices are required by MoDOT and Norfolk Southern Railroad. Subsequent to the approval of Resolution No. 1647-10 and the related agreement, Poepping, Stone, Bach and Associates have agreed to draw up a set of plans to construct these pedestrian warning signals at the crossing. He added that this project, a three-way partnership between the City, MoDOT and the railroad, requires electronics and signal timing that are beyond his expertise to develop.

Council Member Knickerbocker suggested the extra provisions were required because the Parks & Recreation walking trail encompassed this intersection and this was intended to be a high traffic walkway.

Council Member Dobson questioned if this device would be an electronic signal, set by the sidewalk.

Rees said that it would be similar to a standard signal used at a regular street crossing; however, as required, would include a countdown timer. He said that half of the items have already been purchased, since the City is obligated to finish installation by June 30, 2010. This will not be a full set of plans, only a sketch, according to Rees.

If approved with the approval of Resolution No. 1647-10, to follow, the total contract for these engineering services would be \$2,500.

**Re: Transportation Enhancement Funding, Main Street Sidewalks – Program
Agreement Amendment
Missouri Highways & Transportation Commission
(Bill No. 10-013, to follow)**

Rees explained that Bill No. 10-013, to follow, was merely a house-keeping item. On August 4, 2009, Ordinance No. 4505 was approved, allowing the Department of Public Works to secure transportation enhancement funding from the Missouri Highways & Transportation Commission for construction of sidewalks along Main Street.

The Missouri Highways & Transportation Commission have since made changes to the contract, including a correction on the boundaries of the district, a clarification of the indemnification paragraph and changes have now occurred to the lump sum reimbursement method that would allow the City to add more STP funds to the project at a later date.

These changes are reflected in the agreement to be approved with Bill No. 10-013, to follow.

**JOEY BURNHAM – BUILDING CODE OFFICIAL
Re: Chapter 7 Amendment – Adoption of Technical Codes and Standards for Building
and Building Regulations
(Bill No. 10-012, to follow)**

Building Inspector Joey Burnham made the next request on the Council agenda, approval to give Bill No. 10-012 a first reading. Approval of this bill would adopt the 2006 International Technical Codes and Standards and the 2005 National Electrical Codes for building and building regulations, according to Burnham. He added that, currently, the 2003 International Codes and the 2002 National Electric Codes are being enforced. Updating these codes will increase and enhance safety for all construction in Hannibal. Their adoption will also improve the City's standing with ISO and FEMA, as well as, causing Hannibal to gain points in the FEMA Community Rating System program. Burnham concluded by adding that more points in this program will lower flood insurance rates for the City.

In response to a question regarding the adoption of the last set of codes, Burnham stated that the last codes were adopted in 2005. Burnham did not have an answer, but stated that the 2009 Codes were available but were to be re-written because of the number of complaints lodged against them. He said codes are updated every three years, with regulation getting stricter each

time. He added that Quincy, IL is also working under the 2006 codes, which is advantageous, since contractors in the area will be working under the same code.

Council Member Lyng asked if these codes would be available at the library; and Burnham responded that they would be available after adoption. Hallie Yundt-Silver was only waiting until passage to place them on the shelves. He asked Council to approve giving Bill No. 10-012, to follow, a first reading.

PHYLLIS NELSON – CITY COLLECTOR
Re: Request, 2009-2010 Budget Adjustments

City Collector Phyllis Nelson came before Council with a request, similar to those made each year at this time. Her request was for Council approval to perform 2009/10 Budget adjustments. These adjustments, if approved will be done as necessary, for each fund between expenditure lines and possibly departments. She assured Council that no money would be adjusted between funds without Council's express permission. This is a housekeeping measure only. Motion was made by Mayor Pro Tem Behymer to approve Nelson's request. Motion was seconded by Council Member Louderman.

Motion carried.

Re: Request, 2006 Delinquent Personal Tax Write-off

Nelson's second request was for Council's approval to write-off the 2006 delinquent personal taxes at the end of the fiscal year on June 30th. She added that, at the moment, the City still has \$17,755.86 in 2006 outstanding personal taxes. From now until June 30th, that figure may decrease, somewhat; however, after that date, the Collector's office can no longer pursue these taxes, according to Nelson.

The Collector explained that her department was researching other measures for collection in the upcoming year, possibly pursuing tax collection a little more aggressively in the future. She added that she had a couple of options, both either involved citations or court, since the offenders were the same from year to year.

Council Member Knickerbocker asked City Attorney James Lemon if he had a plan for enforcing collection. Lemon responded that, according to the City Code, failure to pay taxes is unlawful and the City has the ability to file against the offenders in City court. He was unsure regarding the successfulness of that endeavor.

City Manager LaGarce stated that he had spoken to the Collector, as well as the entire staff, at length regarding this issue. He explained that there are two provisions in the Charter addressing this issue. He continued by stating that there is one section in the Charter, under *Budget and Finance*, that allows the City to file suit to reclaim taxes; however, it is expensive to file a suit. There is also a section in the City Code that deems it unlawful to violate any code, ordinance, resolution, policy or warrant that the Council establishes, subject to a fine of up to \$500.00.

According to LaGarce, when Council passes the ordinance establishing the tax rate, and an individual fails to pay the tax, they are in violation of City Ordinance.

There is a problem with City personal taxes in that there is no recourse. If an individual does not pay county personal taxes, they are denied the privilege of obtaining their driver's license, if real estate taxes are left unpaid; a lien is brought against their house. The City Manager continued by saying that each year, between \$14,000 and \$19,000 are left delinquent.

In response to Council Member Knickerbocker's question regarding the number of individuals vs. the range of numbers. City Collector Nelson responded that 821 delinquent tax requests and of those, 287 were returned, non-deliverable, leaving 534. Of those, 73 have been paid. To date, that amounts to \$2,353.59, total delinquent taxes collected. Generally, according to Nelson, the amount owed per bill is \$10-\$50; but, at this point, the penalty and interest usually totals an amount greater than the original tax. In addition to the \$2,353 collected in taxes, \$2,800 has been collected in interest.

Council Member Knickerbocker would like to see a formalized plan developed for collection of these taxes, moving forward from there, and in addition, begin issuing citations for non-payment.

Nelson suggested a 'bottom-dollar' amount. Some are only \$3.00-\$4.00 and these may not be worth the time and effort it takes to pursue payment. If Council wishes to suggest a dollar amount, it would be very easy to weed out those that are not cost-effective to try and collect, according to Nelson.

City Attorney Lemon believes that the general concept is allowable; however, he also believes there could be issues involved by attempting to criminally prosecute offenders for not paying their taxes. He suggested that \$5.00 would seem petty, but several hundred dollars would be more worth the City's time and effort. It was agreed that City Attorney Lemon would research the constitutionality regarding the criminal sense of citing non-payment of City taxes.

Roughly 50-100 individuals owe in excess of \$100; most of the offenders owe small amounts, or taxes less than \$25.00, according to the Collector.

Council Member Louderman suggested that all offenders should be cited for non-payment, otherwise the City would be picking and choosing who to cite, and this should not be done. Since this is an ordinance violation, anyone who fails to pay is in violation. He asked for a plan to be developed by the Collector and the City Attorney, no later than the first meeting in June.

Nelson added that citing all offenders could be done; however, it would be hard to do this for 2006 taxes at this point, considering the amount of time available before fiscal yearend.

Lemon suggested that someone should speak with the Judge Cruse, as well, because he was not sure if the Judge would consider this a violation. It was noted that the Municipal Judge has pledged to uphold City Ordinances. Council Member Knickerbocker stated possibly it would be advantageous for Council to develop a specific ordinance that addresses non-payment of City taxes.

City Manager LaGarce stated that he will bring a plan back to Council, as well, and suggested that delinquent tax notices were sent out all year long; however, the Collector clarified LaGarce's statement by saying that taxes were initially mailed in November, then at the end of March or the first of April, reminders are mailed. The first of April each year, the extremely delinquent taxes are mailed for collection (Specifically, 2006 delinquent taxes were mailed on April 1, 2010). Her department strives to get those paid by the end of the fiscal year. She

suggested that she could certainly begin collection efforts of the 2007 delinquent taxes at an earlier date.

City Attorney Lemon stated that an ordinance was in place, making 'failure to have a City sticker' illegal. He explained that anyone who has not paid their City taxes, if they also own a vehicle, would not have purchased a City sticker. At the present, these individuals can be prosecuted for failure to have a City sticker. Council Member Knickerbocker countered that he would like to see a more direct and to-the-point ordinance in place. He stated that he would also like to place a time-frame for development of this plan, possibly before the end of the fiscal year. At this time, a motion was made by Council Member Louderman allowing the City Collector to write-off the 2006 delinquent personal taxes. Motion was seconded by Council Member Barta. Council Member Knickerbocker also made a motion directing the City Attorney to present a plan for delinquent personal tax collections prior to the end of the fiscal year. Motion was seconded by Council Member Louderman.

BEAU HICKS – HCVB DIRECTOR
Re: Mark Twain Day Sponsorship – Agreement
Missouri State Fair
(Resolution No. 1648-10, to follow)

HCVB Director Beau Hicks came before Council with a request for approval of Resolution No. 1648-10, regarding an agreement with the Missouri State Fair/Department of Agriculture, allowing the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the City of Hannibal to sponsor Mark Twain Day at the State Fair this year. He explained that this was a non-monetary agreement which would also involve several of the City's other tourism industries. The limited expenses would include admissions, meals and prizes. He continued by saying that all participants in the Tom & Becky program would be in attendance, also in attendance would be Mark Twain Cave personnel, including Jim Waddell (as Samuel Clemens). Overnight stay is not required, since this will only be a day trip. The only personnel expense for which the City would be responsible will be the HCVB Director.
