CALL TO ORDER

GORDON IPSON

Re: Code Amendment, Section 19, Article II

*Junk, Junked Vehicle, Construction Equipment, Commercial-Grade Vehicles and Commercial-Grade Equipment
(Bill No. 17-012, to follow)*

Former Council Member Gordon Ipson then addressed Council concerning the issue of citizens who would like to restore vehicles and not obtain fines. He suggested issuing permits from the City that allow them to keep the vehicles on their property for one year for \$5. They would be able to get an extension for another year, however, the cost would go up to \$20 and would be required to show proof of restoration. There could be an extension to get a permit for a third year, but it would cost \$50. The 2nd section is for vehicles that are not street legal such as a vehicle they race or an off road vehicle. If any of these are sitting on their property they would need to get a permit to allow them to keep it on their property. If the vehicle is on a licensed truck or trailer, a permit would not be needed. The 3rd section relates to vehicles that would require someone to be out of state when the vehicle requires licensing, they could get a permit for \$5 for the expected time period and re-license their vehicle upon their return. Mayor Hark then questioned Ipson, about the number of permits a property owner could get. Ipson responded that it currently does not provide for a limit, however, you could add this as an amendment.

Council Member Knickerbocker indicated he is 100% opposed to this ordinance. One change is in to a definition, the change is unclear and therefore allows people to simply move things to their back yard. There is no mention of time frame for the initial permit allowance. He reported that a number of years ago Council Member Barta was here and was a part of a team that reviewed this entire ordinance to look at junk vehicles and construction equipment that would be problematic to property values. Knickerbocker feels enacting this ordinance could be very negative to development going on within the City. He then provided a history of the review team, public hearings held and changes that were brought back to Council. Knickerbocker has friends that restores vehicles and he does not know anyone that would keep the vehicle outside over a couple years. He feels this would allow for shade tree mechanics with junk vehicles in their yards. As far as non-street legal vehicles are concerned, demolition derbies are big in this area and someone could load 4, 5, or 6 onto a trailer. He also does not see the need for out of state vehicles to be left in someone's yard for an extended period of time. He stated that the ordinance is very vague and would be difficult to enforce and would be a leap backwards from what was enacted before. He feels there are many pitfalls in this ordinance and feels that many will take advantage of this and

neighborhoods would deteriorate. Ipson indicated he has gone and looked at vehicles that were outside being restored and this was an attempt to meet the needs of citizens.

Council Member Cogdal indicated the enforcement part of it was a concern of hers. She also has an issue of charging someone for a permit to allow someone to restore a vehicle on their own property. She does feel there are legitimate times when people are restoring their vehicles and shouldn't get fines. She feels we should look into really narrowing this down, especially on the portion of how to enforce. Perhaps the citizens could provide their title to prove they as the resident are also the owner. She agrees 99% with Council Member Knickerbocker, however, would like to table the ordinance in order to take a closer look into addressing the resident's needs. She does feel they should have to register, however, she doesn't believe they should have to pay for a permit. Mayor Hark indicated Cogdal's statements were similar to his thoughts. He feels we need to be more specific rather than taking a broad approach.

Knickerbocker indicated he does agree with Council Member Cogdal as well. City Manager Jeff LaGarce suggested applicants appear before Council for the permits, similar to the parade permits/special events. Council Member Veach indicated he would like to see a petition from the neighbors within a 100 foot radius and that be brought before Council.

Van Hoose indicated he would like to see more flexibility in it than what we have now for the person who needs to get their vehicle up and running and may not have the time or money, trying to get their vehicle back on the road to travel back and forth to work.

City Attorney Lemon then indicated he felt Ipson's idea of using the permitting process, the staff could use guidelines and rules as deemed appropriate. If you try and overdraft it there will be a mess. The permitting process could be amended by staff and not bring the ordinance back to Council.

Ipson then indicated he feels if they don't charge for it they value it as nothing and if you are not legitimately restoring a vehicle you will not go out and buy a permit for it. Bill No. 17-012, to follow.

JOHN LYNG – 625 GRAND AVENUE
Re: Hannibal's Flood Protection System

John Lyng, 625 Grand Avenue, then addressed Council. He directed his comment to the newly elected Council Members, stating that there is a high likelihood that they will talk with senior Council Members, the City Manager, staff, and prominent citizens. He believed that during those discussions they would be told that their function is to receive the recommendation and proposals of professional staff and then review and approve them. He indicated this is exactly opposite of what, according to the charter, is to be done. He stated that Council should be leading the staff and giving them direction for fixing problems that arise.

He then suggested permanently increasing the level of the flood protection system. The City was originally told the protection system would always be at least 5 feet over the water level. He indicated in 1993, 2008 and 2013 we had the same situation where the predicted crest of

the river was at the top of the protection system to where we have had to put temporary protective measures on top so the waters would not go over the system. It is his understanding that when this was done, we received money from or were reimbursed by FEMA. His suggestion is to investigate a way to fix the problem to where we don't have to rush to add to the top of the levy. He asked Council to consider the fact that in our neighborhood along the Mississippi where there are several levy districts that are over built from what Corps of Engineers has allowed. They have an effect on the waters that come into Hannibal. He suggests this be taken under consideration to examine a permanent solution.

Knickerbocker then advised that we had an expert in the flood plain and flooding, Joey Burnham. The first thing you have to do is contact the Corps of Engineers and there are some ongoing issues against the levy district across the river and they may take action for them not reducing their levy size back down to the permitting size.

This eliminates Stacy's position and saves the City money. The Mayor commented that the charter states the Park's department is to assist in maintenance and care of public facilities. Andy Dorian responded saying it was already planned for this person to move to full time in the next budget year, this was just a slight modification of the original plan. Re: Bid Award Approval, City/BPW Life Insurance
Kansas City Life Insurance

Zerbonia then informed Council that on Monday, April 3, 2017 sealed bids were opened for the City of Hannibal/BPW Life Insurance coverages, as the existing agreement is due to expire June 30th. \$20,000 of life insurance is maintained on all full-time City/BPW employees, with an additional \$30,000 on Police and Fire Department ranking officers. Bids received have been reviewed and it is the recommendation for acceptance of the renewal bid from Kansas City Life Insurance. KCL, the current life provider, was able to meet all guidelines as outlined in the bid specifications. I recommend the acceptance of the renewal option from Kansas City Life in the amount of \$0.19/thousand benefit, with a two-year rate guarantee. This is an increase over the prior two year period of only \$.01/thousand per person. Motion was made by Council member Van Hoose to approve the request. Motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Knickerbocker.

Re: Policemen & Firemen's Retirement Fund - IRS Restated Compliant Plan Document
IRS Voluntary Compliance Program
(Bill No. 17-011, to follow)

The City Clerk then informed Council that in 2009, the City of Hannibal Policemen and Firemen Retirement Plan Document was submitted to the Internal Revenue Service for a favorable determination letter on the form on the Plan's voluntary compliance resolution with IRS regulations. A favorable determination letter was issued thru the IRS Voluntary Compliance resolution in 2012 with conditions of the adoption of certain amendments to the Plan, in which Council did so via Ordinance No. 4636. Upon participation in the Voluntary Compliance program; the requirement was for resubmission to the IRS every four years incorporating any City approved amendments and enacted IRS guidelines. Accordingly the Council is hereby asked to adopt the attached plan restatement, retroactive to July 1, 2016. This restatement is required as part of the determination letter filing and incorporates all prior plan amendments and updates any reference to cost of living adjustments. This restatement must be adopted within 91 days after the date of the determination letter, otherwise it will be invalidated. Once the official determination letter has been issued, there should not be future need for Council to adopt restated plans as the IRS has since discontinued its determination program, unless a Plan terminates.
